Monday 21 Jul	<input type="checkbox"/> II Kings 20:1-11; <input type="checkbox"/> II Chronicles 32:24-26; <input type="checkbox"/> Isaiah 38:1-22; <input type="checkbox"/> Isaiah 40:1-31	<p>We begin with Hezekiah's sickness and recovery..</p> <p>Isaiah 40 is a chapter of comfort, referring to the work of John the Baptist and the following events (see 40:3-5).</p>
Tuesday 22 Jul	<input type="checkbox"/> Isaiah 41:1-43:28	<p>The contrast between idolatry and the Servant (Christ) of God is sharply drawn by Isaiah in this reading. Note how often the audience is challenged by God to consider what He has done and can do.</p>
Wed 23 Jul	<input type="checkbox"/> Isaiah 44:1 to 47:15	<p>Isaiah continues to open up the future for his audience. One of the great predictions of all time is in 44:28-45:7, where Isaiah predicts the work of Cyrus the Great well over 100 years before it occurred, and then says that the purpose of this prophecy is so that men can KNOW that Jehovah is the ONLY true God (see 45:5-7)!</p>
Thursday 24 Jul	<input type="checkbox"/> Isaiah 48:1 to 50:11	<p>In chapter 48, God justifies His anger. In chapters 49 and 50, Isaiah discusses the role of God's Servant.</p>
Friday 25 Jul	Isaiah 51:1 to 53:12	<p>This reading begins with God's calling people to faithfulness and ends with one of the most famous pieces of all literature: Isaiah 53, the portrait of Isaiah's Suffering Servant: Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God Who takes away the sins of the world (John 1:29). NOTE the fact that the suffering of Jesus was known and predestined before it occurred. The rejection of Christ was no surprise!"</p>

Saturday
26 Jul Isaiah 54:1 to 56:12

Here is God's commitment to mankind, and His invitation for all to come to Him and follow His ways.

Sunday
27 Jul Isaiah 57:1 to 59:21

In chapters 57 and 58 we have a contrast between what God wants and what He gets from men. In chapter 59 we have His call for man to depart from all sin.
